President's Column

From Rod Downey, President

Since my Last Report:

Committee Business – The committee thanks the clubs for feedback on the region classes, and the future of Summer School. There was no real consensus regarding the region classes. Regarding Summer School, based on committee discussions and your feedback, we will send a submission to the Branch; mainly to

the effect that the region is not in favour of having Summer School in Wellington every two years. Perhaps once every three years might be possible with a central (Branch) organiser being involved, and less pressure on the clubs for baking (for example, only having biscuits and fruit at morning teas). We also wondered if Summer School was a bit too close to Christmas, and whether it could begin more or less at the beginning of the New Year.

You might be amused to know that, on reading documents in the Region Archives, the current Summer School discussions parallel similar Region and Branch discussions from 40 to 50 years ago!

New Region Committee Member – We welcome a new committee member, Andrew Oliver. Since Linden is hosting the New Dancers' Celebration, he is especially welcome.

Region Events

Historical RSCDS Dances, 12 April – Thanks to Elaine Laidlaw for tutoring, and Lynne Scott, Sam Berkahn and Thomas Nikora for providing the music for this nice class, which was reasonably well attended. This year, the dances were from Books 6 to 11. Here is a link where the dances are discussed. We plan to continue this initiative next year.

Region Classes – The *Basics class* is quite well attended and we thank Melva Waite for her sterling work here.

The Intermediate class – Sadly, there were only four registrations for the Intermediate classes. Given the organisation required – the time investment for the

tutor's preparation, the class go-fers, musicians' and other helpers' time – plus the fact we could cancel the hall with no penalty, we reluctantly decided to cancel this class.

The message is: Please register early if you want classes to continue. These classes take a lot of organisation and preparation, and spare a thought for people like Diane Bradshaw and Lynne and her musicians who were busily preparing for the classes.

Committee Analysis – The committee discussed the Intermediate Class and believe that things were affected by the proximity to 2024/25 Summer School. The incoming committee for 2026 will discuss class options: the Basics class will likely continue, and ideas around Development classes will be discussed.

Special Club Events

- Tawa Club had a well-attended annual dance, where I
 was very pleased to present Désirée Patterson with a
 Region Appreciation Award for her many contributions
 to the region, especially behind the scenes.

Upcoming Region Events

Two Advanced Classes – Tutor: Joy Tracey. These are on Saturday afternoons 12 July and 30 September, 1-4:30pm at St John's Church Hall in Johnsonville. These will be Joy's first classes for the Region, so a bit special. *Please register as soon as you can!*

Special Region Event: Fugues Day – Saturday 11 October, 1-4pm, at St John's Church Hall in Johnsonville. I will tutor a day devoted to fugues. Dancing fugues are analogous to musical fugues, where some figure is repeated as a theme. Fugues tend to be relatively complicated, and are both a challenge to dance, and a great reward when achieved. They are especially good for working on teamwork and phrasing.

New Dancers' Celebration – 4 October, Knox Church Hall. Linden Club has kindly agreed to host the 2025 New Dancers' Celebration. There will be two preparation classes, which will be taken by Ann Oliver, on 23 and 30 September at St David's Multicultural Hall in Petone.

Feedback – We will send out materials asking clubs if you want us to change the structure of what we offer. Do you want other offerings etc? If you have any thoughts please get back to us in a timely manner as we need to book halls in *September 2025* for 2026!

Region AGM – 4 November, 7.30 pm, at Community House, Petone. Please put the date in your diaries. We really need your support at the meeting. You won't be coopted to the committee, but we need you to come. This is your opportunity to give feedback to the committee, which will be changing this year!

Obituary

Gary Morris passed away on 10 March this year, just before the March issue of Harbour City Happenings was published. At the time, a brief note regarding his passing promised a full obituary in the next issue.

This obituary was first published in the April issue of the NZ Branch publication, *Kiwi News*.

Gary Wilson Morris

5 September 1938 to 10 March 2025

Gary began dancing as a boy in the 1950s in Hawke's Bay. He recollected that in those early days, they danced in the drill hall amongst the tanks and guns. He was an accomplished musician and accompanied the dancers on the piano. The arrival of Madge Laing inspired him to become a dancer.

In 1962, while on a working holiday in Scotland, he went to St Andrews to take his teaching certificate examinations. Because he had travelled so far (on a ship – the only way possible at the time) he was able to spend four weeks at St Andrews, passing his Preliminary Certificate at the end of the first fortnight, and his Teachers' Certificate two weeks later.

Since that time, Gary made several more visits to St Andrews. One of his friends in Scotland was instrumental in Gary being invited to join a group of dancers going to give demonstrations in South Africa in 1974.

Gary worked in different parts of New Zealand and was frequently asked to teach at the clubs he joined. He was in demand as a teacher of day schools, weekend schools and summer schools throughout the country, also serving on the New Zealand Branch Council and the Branch's Technical Committee.

He was a very supportive trainer of candidates for RSCDS teaching examinations. In 1991 he became an Examiner. When Gary considered it was time to step aside from examining, the RSCDS asked him to be an Emeritus Examiner. In 2003, he received an RSCDS Scroll and in 2004, Life Membership of the New Zealand Branch.

In 1978, he convened the Wellington Region sub-committee that arranged the publication of the *Morison's Bush Collection* and later the Branch's book, *The Aotearoa Collection*. He was also responsible for the Branch's 25th Anniversary book, *Silver Threads*.

Gary devised several dances, including *The Reverend John MacFarlane*, published by the RSCDS in Book 37.

In more recent years Gary taught at Lower Hutt and Ngaio clubs. He moved to the Wairarapa in the late 1990s and became a foundation member of the Carterton Scottish Country Dance Club in 2000. He was created a Life Member of the Carterton Club in 2019.

Citation

Desiree Patterson is one of those people the Region and the Branch have to thank for working behind the scenes to keep Scottish Country Dancing functioning in New Zealand. Most notably, Désirée has been editor of the Region's Newsletter, Harbour City Happenings, since June 2014. This is the longest term after Carol Smith who began the newsletter. Since 2019, Désirée has been the interface between the Region and the Branch through her editing of RSCDS NZ Branch Magazine and Branch newsletters. These tasks involve quite substantial editorial organisation and expertise. We all enjoy these newsy publications. Whilst Désirée continues in these roles outside of the Region Committee, she also served on the Region Committee from 2011 until 2019, dealing with application forms, name tags, collecting monies, and dancing as go-fer at Region classes; again heavily involved in the background. Désirée served on the organising committee for the 2013 Region Day School. Within the Region, Désirée has been active and visible in generally helping with events, and at the club level has been secretary of two Region clubs. We thank Désirée for her continued and sustained service.

The early part of the year is always exciting as keen new dancers join the club and find out just how much fun there is to be had. This year has been especially exciting with lots of live music and special occasions for both newer and experienced dancers to enjoy.

March saw St Patrick's Day – A great crowd filled the floor, channelling their inner Irish and creating a sea of green with shamrocks, leprechauns and more for Johnsonville's 2025 St Patrick's Day celebration. Jason Morris in his new role of 'club musician' made his solo debut, bringing us grand accordion music to complement Rod's programme of Irish-themed favourites (plus one or two new dances to keep us on our toes).

April brought our first Tartan Night – At Johnsonville's first Tartan Night of 2025 dancers and visitors turned out in tartan, bringing a wonderful buzz to Khandallah Town Hall. Great to see items from the club's second-hand tartan 'shop' on the dance floor. Rod MC'd a programme of dances to suit new dancers, and walked through most dances to help everyone relax and enjoy the night.

This time Jason performed as 'leader of the band' for the first time, with Hilary Ferral on violin, and a newcomer to SCD music on double bass – welcome to Anna Miller. Supper 'plates' were so bounteous, we needed an extra table for supper!

Beltane celebrations came in May – This was only the club's second Beltane celebration, building on the success of 2024's Beltane event. As with Halloween/Samhain, we celebrate this traditional Celtic festival in sync with the Northern hemisphere calendar. This year's hall decorations evoked the fire theme of Beltane in flame-coloured wall drops and ribbons, and an assortment of Beltane 'coos' reminded us of the milk-stealing fairies who walk the world at this time.

Rod's programme referenced fairies, fire, May and the Rowan tree, and the dance floor swirled with colours of fire and spring flowers. We were fortunate Jason became available to play on the night, and brought another new musician to Jville – welcome to fiddler Fiona Gullery. Ingenious (and delicious) Beltane-themed supper treats added to the fun, and once again, Aline the Bard appeared, this time weaving us a story around the Beltane Flame.

The big one – 70th Anniversary Celebration in June – On King's Birthday Monday 2 June, the club celebrated 70 years since the probable start date of Scottish country dancing in the Johnsonville area in 1955, as a Friendship Group of St Columba Church. Much is lost in the mists of time, but this has been the accepted date since 1976.

It was envisaged as a low-key celebration, at home at Khandallah Town Hall on club night, with the ability to decorate the hall and start a bit earlier because the regular Monday pilates class doesn't operate on public holidays. To keep it even more low key and relaxed, the committee decided against a potluck dinner (with all the concomitant cooking, heating up, setting up and cleaning up). Instead, we dined at Namaste Indian restaurant in Khandallah, where all we had to do was eat, and then make a 2-minute walk to the hall for dancing.

The night was all about Johnsonville's club members — giving current members a good time, and honouring members of the past who built today's thriving club. Tutor Rod Downey put together a programme of dances he'd devised for some of our longstanding members. They included inaugural Life Members Isla and Eric Norris, and current members dancing since the 1980s — Elizabeth Rendell, John and Aline Homes, and John Markham.

A magnificent double-layered chocolate cake was the centrepiece at supper time, with those four 1980s members sharing the task of cutting the cake. Thanks to new dancer Thomas V for his generous donation of time and ingredients to bake the cake for the occasion.


After ten dances we were glad to have an extensive late afternoon tea, sufficient to avoid having to have a meal later!


